

Protect our wires from livestock & other animals



Cattle fencing and paneling is a great protector around guy wires.


Each year Garkane find instances where animals have rubbed up against and degraded the guy wires that come from our power lines. This can cause undue wear and tear, and power outages that can damage equipment. It is important that if there is an electric service where livestock graze near, in order to protect it, we ask that fencing be placed around it. (152900) If Garkane finds an issue where livestock owners have been negligent, financial restitution may be asked from the owner of the animals to repair the line. This becomes a problem where the electric service is for someone other than the livestock owner. So please be considerate to your neighbors and review your property for potential hazards.

Off-Peak and On-Peak Rates: April - September

Weekdays & Saturdays



All day Sundays and Federal holidays you will enjoy off-peak prices at \$5.25¢ per/kWh.



Half-Price Power peak hours shift one hour

Garkane's peak demand window has shifted from 4 - 10 p.m. to now 3 - 9 p.m., so in an effort to better match our members needs, along with aligning our program to better match when our peak usage happens, we are moving our summer on-peak hours. Our objective is to keep your power rates as low as possible and your participation in this program makes a huge difference. This program has some great benefits to both the participant and in helping Garkane Energy better manage the power resources available. We hope you have noticed savings on your power bill by participating in this program and the more you are able to shift your usage to the less expensive Half-Price power, the more you will save.

Beginning April 1st, our summer hours of the Half-Price Power program will apply. The new sum-

mer hours for more expensive electricity will be 3:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. Mon-Sat, as shown in red in the graphic above. The rest of the time, you will enjoy the reduced rate as Half-Price Power any time after 9:00 p.m. and before 3:00 p.m. the following day, including all day Sunday and all day on Federal holidays. This program helps with more than just saving money, it is a valuable conservation tool for both Garkane and our wholesale supplier Deseret Power. For every kWh not used, is a kWh that does not have to be produced. These conservation efforts, added up over thousands of members and thousands of kWh, makes a big difference. Connect/Disconnect changes for seasonal irrigators



Garkane is making some changes to its process regarding irrigation accounts. (10002896)

It has been Garkane's practice to disconnect/reconnect an irrigation account for the season without a

request from the account holder. In an effort to accommodate all of our members, it will now be the responsibility of the account holder to request to be disconnected or reconnected at the beginning and

ending of each watering season.

Remote meter technology allows us to shut off your meter remotely in our billing system, but not remove the physical meter. The meter will still allow electricity use if needed, but any kWh usage will be reflected on your next bill when the account is reconnected.

Garkane's Marketing & Member Service Manager gets elected to national communicators board



Neal Brown, Garkane's Marketing & Member Service Manager recently got elected to the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association (NRECA) Certified Communicator's Board of Directors. The mission of the Certified Cooperative Communicator (CCC) Program is to raise the level of strategic thinking, competence and ethical standards of electric cooperative communicators by increasing the knowledge, skills and abilities of its candidates. The CCC Board is responsible for the program's overall policy and direction, as well as overseeing standards and requirements to become

certified and maintain certification. The Board of Directors is a fifteen person board made up of certified communicators from across the country. To be elected, a candidate must first (16400) become a Certified Communicator which can be a two-year process, by submitting an application, passing a high-standard portfolio review, and passing a four-hour examination. From the group of nationwide CCC's, elections are held yearly for two-year terms, and Neal Brown was elected out of eleven others running for the board seat. His term will start in June, 2021.





From the CEO's Desk

Dear Members of Garkane,

I'd like to personally invite you to participate in our virtual annual meeting this year on Wednesday, May 26th. The Board has decided that it would be best to hold the annual meeting remotely for one more year, rather than in a large public gathering. We feel last year's virtual annual meeting was a success and would love more participation from our mem-

bership. This year we will be providing giveaways for members who comment and participate in the meeting.

In addition, I want to remind our members of our upcoming rate increase beginning in 2022. Here are some FAQ and answers regarding the rate increase.

Why are rates increasing?

Effective January 1, 2022, Deseret Power (Garkane's Wholesale electric provider) will be implementing a 9% increase to Garkane. Because of cost cutting measures, internal efficiencies, and growth in sales, Garkane is expecting to absorb a portion of the unavoidable wholesale power cost increase. Garkane members will see a rate increase in the neighborhood of 5% after experiencing zero increases for almost six years. Deseret Power attributes their increase to Garkane to operation inflation and added costs to generate electricity, mortgage requirements from their banker, impacts of environmental regulations, and much needed investments to reliably generate and deliver power in the changing industry landscape.

How much will rates increase?

Although the Board of Directors have

not yet approved the structure of the rate increase, Garkane expects to be implementing a 5% increase for members. For an average household with a \$150 power bill, that would roughly equate to a \$7.50 increase on a monthly bill. There is a strong possibility that the member monthly charge will increase more than the kWh charge.

When will the rate increase be reflected on the power bills?

The change will appear on the monthly statements starting in January 2022.

What steps has Garkane taken to minimize the impact of the increase on our member owners?

Garkane has been able to keep distribution expenses (expenses that we have some control over...not power supply) nearly flat over the last few years. Through retirement attrition, Garkane has been able to keep labor costs low, while total utility plant growth continues to grow. Meaning, we are able to grow as a company while maintaining a consistent number of employees. Garkane offers a number of options to help you manage your power bill. Some of those services include automatic payment options, prepay service, budget billing, energy audits and many new energy efficiency programs. Garkane also has aggressive energy efficiency programs to

help members reduce their usage, thus saving Garkane from purchasing expensive energy during higher demand periods. Check out our website for more tools. (9997460)

Should I be concerned about the cooperative's future stability?

No, periodically the co-op has to raise rates, and it is the responsibility of the Board of Directors to monitor financial stability, which they do very carefully. Rate increases are necessary from time to time to offset rising material and power supply costs. The last rate increase Garkane instituted was in 2016, nearly 6 years ago. Compared to other industries, like health care, groceries, internet and the phone industry which have rate increases nearly every year, Garkane is very stable, and is financially sound.

We realize any rate increase, no matter how small still affects our members financially, so we approach this issue very seriously. We work hard at operating efficiently so when we do have to have a rate increase, it will be as minimal as possible. If you have any further questions about the upcoming rate increase or anything else affecting your cooperative, never hesitate to reach out.

Help protect our local antiquities and archeology

The Antiquities Act is the first law to establish that archeological sites on public lands are important public resources. It gives federal agencies the responsibility to manage the public lands to preserve for present and future generations the historic, scientific, and cultural values of the archaeological and historic sites and structures on these lands. It also authorizes the President to protect landmarks, structures, and objects of historic or scientific interest by designating them

as National Monuments.

The Act grew out of concerns that developed over the course of the last quarter of the 19th century for the preservation of America's archeological sites and the artifacts and information that they contained.

National and regional educators and scientists, including those involved in the developing profession of archeology, joined together in a movement to safeguard sites on public lands being endangered by haphazard dig-

ging and purposeful, commercial artifact looting. (302416)

The Antiquities Act stands as an important achievement in the progress of conservation and preservation efforts in the United States. Its effects are still felt. The Act created the basis for the federal government's efforts to protect archeological sites from looting and vandalism. It provided a foundation of public policy from which more specific public attention to and preservation of historic places

and structures, cultural landscapes, and other cultural resources developed during the course of the 20th century.

Today, many different organizations cooperate in diverse partnerships, including governments at the Federal, state, tribal and local levels; professional and scholarly groups; and communities. In shaping public policy to protect a broad array of cultural and natural resources, the impact of the Antiquities Act is unmatched. (source, www.nps.gov)
